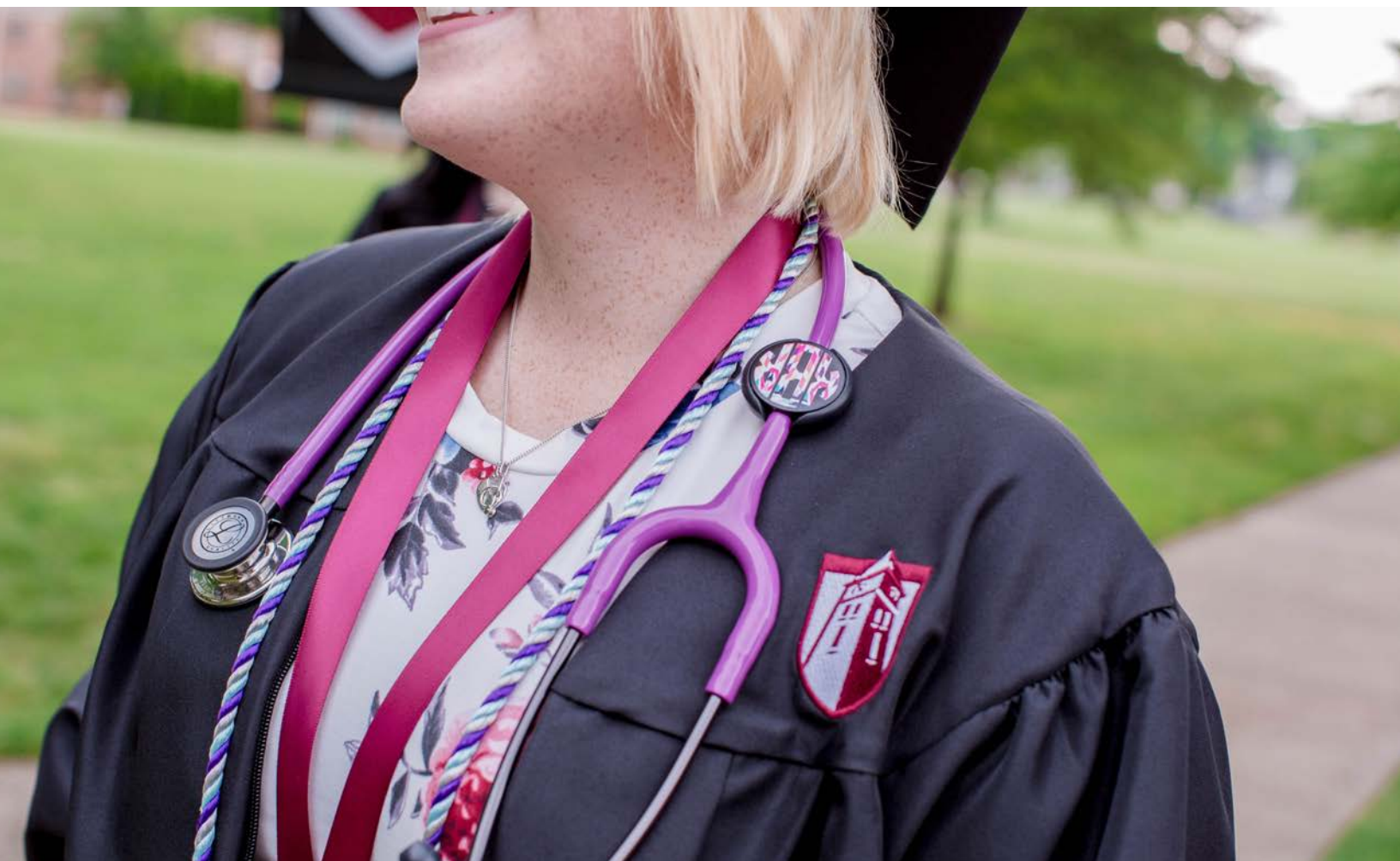

Thank you for your interest in Cumberland University's BSN nursing program. The Jeanette C Rudy School of Nursing seeks candidates who will bring the qualities of: scholarship, caring, resilience, integrity, collaboration, service, passion, vision, excellence, professionalism, motivation, commitment and excellence to the profession of nursing. Our program has two available five-semester tracks:

Standard (cohorts start fall and spring semesters) and Evening/Weekend program (cohort start each fall and spring)

Our mission is to prepare caring, highly competent graduates to provide excellent, evidenced-based nursing care for individuals, families, and communities across the lifespan with emphasis placed on knowledge, skills, attitudes, and experiences that promote clinical reasoning, integrity, and life-long learning.

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

Standard Track:

Designed for the student who prefers classes in the daytime, didactic classes for this track typically meet during days and afternoons. Labs and Clinicals meet based on availability of clinical sites and can be scheduled Monday-Sunday in the day or evening. Please note, just like any undergraduate major, this schedule is not consistent in its times each semester. Due to the fast pace and high-intensity nature of nursing programs, we discourage working many hours. The Standard track is a five-semester program with summers reserved for specific remaining GEC courses or to gain valuable healthcare experience by working, completing externships or doing mission work.

Nights/Weekend Track:

This track is designed for the non-traditional student. This is not an accelerated program, but it is five semesters. Classes are usually held Monday through Friday, beginning at 6 pm and lasting until 9 or 10 pm. Labs and Clinicals are held on the weeknights and/or weekends. Please note: Former students have described this program as intensive since limited time for studying is available for those with a full-time job. Summers are reserved for specific remaining GEC courses or to gain valuable healthcare experience by working, completing externships or doing mission work.

Graduation timeline

If you are admitted for the fall semester, you will take nursing classes in the fall, spring (year 1); fall, spring (year 2) and graduate after the fall semester (year 3). If you are admitted in the spring semester, you will take nursing classes in the spring (year 1), fall, spring (year 2) and fall, spring (year 3) and graduate in the spring. Students may choose to attend full-time or part-time. Part-time attendance will extend the graduation timeline.

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

Teaching-Learning Facility for the School of Nursing

The nursing program is housed in McFarland Hall, (500 Park Avenue, Lebanon TN) which was previously a wing and the intensive care unit (ICU) of McFarland Hospital. The space is leased from Vanderbilt Wilson County Hospital, which owns the facility. One wing and the previous ICU of the hospital has been converted into teaching facilities for Cumberland University including faculty offices, classrooms, clinical practice laboratories and a simulation laboratory, while a portion of the hospital remains functional. The facility is located approximately one mile from the main campus. For hands-on clinical practice, students will travel to healthcare facilities as well as other learning sites within a 65-mile radius of McFarland Hall. We do not allow students to pick their own clinical assignments, but we will work around any approved University related activities.

ATI TEAS Exam

The ATI TEAS (Test of Essential Academic Skills) is used to determine the candidate's academic preparedness level. The exam covers the areas of reading, mathematics, science, English and language usage. You will earn a score and a rank of developmental, basic, proficient, advanced, or exemplary. A set cut score is not required on the TEAS Exam; however, exam scores are one component of the ranking admission process used to identify students for admission into the nursing program. The nursing program highly recommends that the student score at the proficient level or higher to be considered for enrollment in the nursing program. If the student scores at the basic or developmental level, the nursing faculty recommend that the student plan a course of study to strengthen basic academic skills in reading, English, math and science. The higher the score and the rank, the higher the candidate will place in the pool of applicants which will increase the potential for admission.

Register for an ATI account, schedule your exam, and pay at <https://atitesting.com/teas>. The student must choose Cumberland University as the college which will receive the ATI TEAS score so that the score can be available for admission consideration. TEAS Exam scores must be earned within one year of seeking candidacy to the School of Nursing. The test can be retaken once each application period after a 30 day wait time.

You are urged to go to the TEAS website and start prepping for the exam. ATI has a suggested six-week study plan available on the website. For cost and more information on preparing, please go to www.atitesting.com/teas. Cumberland University Library has two TEAS prep books on reserve in the Vise Library. There are study manuals, online practice tests and a SmartPrep Tutorial available on the ATI website.

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

Transfer Policy from Other Schools of Nursing

Transfer students must meet the requirements for admission to the University as outlined in the most current Cumberland University Catalog and for the School of Nursing as found in both the Cumberland University Catalog and the current School of Nursing Student Handbook. Students who desire to transfer from an accredited baccalaureate-nursing program and have never made a D or F in a nursing course will be evaluated on an individual basis by the Nursing Admission & Progression Committee to determine placement.

Any student who has previously attended another nursing program and is admitted to the Cumberland University School of Nursing with a final course grade of a "D" or lower in two or more nursing courses will be evaluated by the Nursing Admission & Progression Committee. Candidates who have earned a D or F in another nursing program MAY be admitted and allowed to restart at the beginning of the nursing curriculum but will be assessed as already having one (1) "D" or lower in a nursing course. Therefore, if the student receives another "D" or lower in ANY Nursing course at Cumberland University, the student will be dismissed from the program.



PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS

- Students must have applied to Cumberland University and have been initially accepted into the university with a declared nursing major in order to be considered for candidacy.
- In order to be “initially accepted”, the Office of Admissions must have official transcripts from ALL colleges and universities attended.
- After acceptance to Cumberland University, candidates must take the ATI TEAS entrance test.
- Prerequisites must have been satisfactorily completed, with the exception of nine hours of selected courses* prior to entering the first upper division nursing course. These classes can be in progress up until two weeks before nursing courses begin. Please see page eight (8) of this packet for a full list of prerequisites required.
- Admissions process: Candidates must fill out the candidacy form. All candidacy applications will be reviewed by the Rudy School of Nursing Admission Progression Committee. A weighted admission ranking system will be used to determine admission to the BSN program. The ranking is based on the pool of candidates for a particular semester and the number of clinical sites and lab slots available.
- Candidates must have earned a minimum of 2.75 cumulative G.P.A (4.00 scale) in coursework to be placed in the pool of candidates for ranking (NO EXCEPTIONS).

- Additional factors which will be weighed in the ranking scores are: ATI scores and scores in science courses. Grades of D's, F's, course repeats, and withdrawals will adversely impact the ranking. Grades of D's and F's in science courses with repeats negatively impact ranking. Failure from another nursing program will negatively impact the ranking.
- All candidates must have successfully completed their science courses with a C or higher: Human Anatomy & Physiology I and II, Microbiology & Chemistry (BIO 213, BIO 214, BIO 203, Chem 103). These must have been satisfactorily completed prior to entering the first upper division nursing course (NO EXCEPTIONS).
- All other prerequisites must have been satisfactorily completed, with the exception of selected courses (these are listed below and can be taken in the summer between nursing courses.) PLEASE NOTE: there is no financial aid in the summers.

*Acceptable lower division coursework, up to nine hours, that can be taken in the summer semesters, include the following:

CIS 170 Introduction to Microcomputer Applications

HIS 201, or HIS 202 US History 1 and 2
Or HIS 191 or 192 World Civilization 1 & 2

ENG 215 Introduction to Literature or
ENG 216 Topics in Literature
Fine Arts Elective

STEPS TO SEEKING CANDIDACY

1

Apply and get initially accepted to Cumberland University

2

Once initially accepted to the university, study and take the ATI TEAS Exam.

3

After you've taken the TEAS Entrance Exam, you must fill out the Cumberland Nursing Candidacy Form. The form is available on the Cumberland website under Academics - Rudy School of Nursing and Health Professions - Nursing Candidacy or [click here](#). Please note that you may not seek candidacy for both program tracks.

4

The deadline to apply is September 1 for Spring and March 1 for Fall. Notification of progression will be sent by October 1 for Spring and May 1 for Fall to the student's email on their candidacy form.

5

Once admitted, return your Student Acceptance or Refusal of Admission form by the deadline specified on the form.
